With really strong and heavy doors and windows, it's the perfect safehouse for visiting heads of state, or celebrities who want to enjoy complete privacy.

Taking up the entire top floor of the hotel, the suite has its own private elevator to take guests to an apartment with 12 rooms, which hold a Steinway grand piano, billiard room, library and private fitness center.

AUSTRALIAN TRAVEL TIPS

Passports And Visas

To enter Australia you will need a passport valid for the duration of your stay and a valid Australian tourist visa.

It is now possible for Australian visa applications to be made online. If you are a short-term visitor or business traveller, the process is easy. If you plan to work, you will need a work permit which is limited to single under 25's and which expires after 3 months. Tourist visas are generally valid for a stay of 3 or 6 months.

Air Travel

Avoid flying in the early morning or late afternoon. These flights are usually heavily booked by business people travelling between the capital cities.

Do you need extra leg room? Ask to be seated by the exit doors as these seats seem to have more leg room.

A tax of A\$30 per adult is payable when departing from Australia.

Road Travel

When planning your trip, keep in mind that Australia is an enormous country. Melbourne and Brisbane are a long day's drive from Sydney, and driving from Sydney to Perth takes the better part of a week.

The most serious danger on the road is driver fatigue. Look for driver refreshment stations and stop and rest after driving for several hours.

Be careful when driving on country roads at night in cold weather. Cattle and native animals such as kangaroos lie on the road surface, which keeps the warmth of the sun.

Shops

Shopping hours vary across the country but shops in tourist and city areas are generally open until 6pm, with the exception of late night shopping on Thursdays or Fridays in different states. Most shops are closed on Sundays although supermarkets and major shopping malls may open with limited hours.

Weather

Australia experiences temperate weather for most of the year but the climate can vary because of the size of the continent. The northern states have warm weather much of the time, with the southern states experiencing cooler winters. Remember, unlike in the Northern Hemisphere, the farther south you go in Australia, the colder it gets.

The peak travel season in the most popular parts of Australia is the Aussie winter. July is the busiest month in these parts; you'll need to book accommodation and tours well in advance, and you will pay higher rates then, too.
