The best years of your life?

Many parents in Britain send their children to boarding school. They do so with the best of intentions: to give their offspring the best possible start in life. However, is it really good for children to

- be separated from their parents for months at a time? The experience can certainly be traumatic, especially at the beginning.
 - Luke Clegg is eight years old. In a few days' time, his life is going to change radically. He is going to
- 10 leave his family and start at boarding school. Not surprisingly, he is worried. His list of concerns is long: 'Sleeping without Mummy and Daddy near me, not sleeping in my own bed, not having all my teddies ...' Luke is one of almost 100,000 children who will
- 15 attend boarding school in the UK this year. However, he is younger than the majority, who start when they are thirteen.

Dominic Allen, who is eleven, is also going to start boarding school this year. He will have to travel

20 6,000 miles to get there, as he lives in China with his English father and Chinese mother. Dominic's father, who himself went to boarding school, is convinced that his son will benefit from the experience. His mother, Zhang Lanxin, is not so sure. 'It's a hard decision to make,' she says. 'We want the best for Dominic. As parents we make a choice, and we hope we are not making the wrong choice.'

Dominic is in two minds about the move: 'I'll feel sad because I'll be away from my parents for a long time,

- and excited because I don't know what the school is like, and excited because I look forward to doing fun stuff.

 His father has given him some advice: 'My dad told me that you have to accept the fact that you're not going to see your family for a long time.' I have no going to see your family
 - for a long time.' However, some people think that this need to act tough and to project a hard image can have long-lasting negative effects. Nick Dufell, who has written a book about boarding schools, is one of them. He describes the typical personality of someone who
- has been through the boarding school system: 'Outside they are competent and confident. Inside they are private and insecure and are unable to bond or form full relationships with others.'

It seems, then, that parents should ask themselves
some serious questions before sending their young
ones to boarding school. It could harm them for life.
