D ... and now we've come to the final part of our feature on film tourism. Maybe you've fallen in love with a film and you want to see where it was made. If so, you're not alone. India and New Zealand may have few cultural similarities. However, both are now hot destinations for tourists, thanks to the blockbuster films Slumdog Millionaire and The Lord of the Rings. Don't fancy either of those? Well, here's Millie with our last four travel picks.

M Thanks, Dominic. Now, this is one place I'd love to visit: the tiny Greek island of Skopelos, home of the musical Mamma Mia! It's hot, absolutely stunning, and very popular – especially with couples and anyone who wants to get married! Be warned: other neighbouring islands are bigger and there's no airport on Skopelos. But don't be put off, these are small inconveniences compared to the huge delights on offer. It really is a paradise island.

D Hmm, sounds wonderful ... even though I hated the film! Pierce Brosnan was a terrible singer.

M No! I thought the film was hilarious! Well, maybe you'd prefer Harry Potter? Visitors to England's Alnwick Castle, which was the setting for Hogwarts School, increased by 120% after the films. You can also travel on the actual Hogwarts Express train in Scotland! Brave tourists can still visit the frightening Forbidden Forest in England, even though Hagrid's home is no longer there.

D My kids would love it. But I think I'd prefer your next destination

M South America? Me too. Che Guevara may have been famous for his politics, but it seems he's also inspired us to travel! In *The Motorcycle Diaries* we watched Che riding a motorcycle across the continent, and now many tourists are copying the film. The 'Che Guevara tour' finishes in the country of Bolivia, where Che died. It also takes you across Cuba and, of course, starts in Argentina, Che's home country. It's a long trip, but always fascinating – although you might bore friends when you tell them about the amazing views afterwards. And you don't have to ride a motorbike. Most don't!

D I'm not surprised! And your last choice?

M Well, this is a bit different! Filmmakers painted the Andalusian village of Júzcar blue for the 2011 film *The Smurfs*, and changed villagers' lives. In the past, Júzcar attracted about 300 tourists a year. But in the six months after *The Smurfs*, around 80,000 fans visited. Many arrived wearing Smurfs costumes, which is either funny – or terrifying! Most villagers have been very enthusiastic, with 141 residents voting to keep Júzcar blue and only a small number of objections. The village website announced that Smurfs and Júzcar villagers had a lot in common: they've both always cared a lot about the environment and nature – especially mushrooms!
