








On this day thousands of men and women take to the streets to protest current inequalities. Demonstrations are organized to demand the same rights and duties for both genders.

In 1975, the UN decided to create this day to give official status to the demands of women for equal opportunities with respect to men.

- In Spain → March 8, 1978


The first authorized demonstration in Spain for March 8 after the Civil War was in 1978, but a year before, an event was held in the Pozo del Tío Raimundo, in Madrid, in which a meeting was held, called by the platform of feminist organizations.





In other countries

8th of March is known as La Festa Della Donna in Italy. The day is celebrated by the people of Italy giving mimosa flowers to the women in their lives, similar to red roses on Valentine's Day. The yellow flower was chosen partly because it is in bloom in early March, and because they are often cheap.. In other countries, like Argentina, there will also be total or partial strikes in some sectors.
