Wednesday / Thursday:

THEORY: THE COMPARISON OF ADVERBS

The comparison is the observation of two persons or things judging how similar or different they are. The comparison may be used with adjectives and with adverbs.

We are going to focus on the comparison of adverbs. Adverbs of manner are derivative words from adjectives: Example: Slow (adjective) → Slowly (adveeb)

Adverbs	Adjective	Adverb	Comparative	Superlative
Adverbs ending in-ly	happy	happily	more happily than	the mosr happily
Adverbs with the same form as adjectives	hard	hard	harder than	the hardest
	late	late	later than	the latest
	early	early	earlier than	the earliest
Adverbs with irregular forms	good	well	better than	the best
	bad	badly	worse than	the worst

We use the comparative when we compare two persons or things.

We use the superlative when we compare one person or thing with many more or at least with three items.
